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Kia ora everyone

From the start of this term I have taken on the role of leading the Taupo Community of Learners (Kahui Ako). This position comes with a time allocation that equates to two days a week, meaning there have been some personnel changes at the college. Deputy Principal Alistair Froggett will be Acting Principal to backfill my Kahui Ako time and Richard Murphy takes on the role of Acting Deputy Principal.

While still in its infancy, the Kahui Ako has enormous potential in terms of benefitting all young people in the community. Teachers across the community are currently working together on writing strategies that are designed to improve the writing of students from all year levels and abilities. Importantly schools are beginning to have a better understanding of what level students need to attain to be prepared for the next stage of their schooling. Particularly pleasing is the involvement of the early childhood sector – they are eager to ensure the transition from early childhood to primary is as seamless as possible.

The major school production "Rock of Ages" is shaping up to be a fantastic show and I strongly urge you to buy a ticket as soon as possible. I have had the pleasure of listening to many of the rehearsals while working in my office and the quality of the music is impressive. If you are a child of the eighties, the songs will be totally relatable!

I would like to acknowledge the tremendous amount of work that both staff and students put into making this show a success. Particularly pleasing is the large number of former students that used to work in the 'tech booth' which have come back and are readily giving their time to assist with sound and lighting.

The college continues to explore different ways of delivering the New Zealand Curriculum to prepare our young people for the next stage of their lives. The Taupo-nui-a-Tia College graduate profile will help guide our thinking in terms of what education at Taupo-nui-a-Tia College will look like in the future. Interdisciplinary subjects, project-based learning and changes to the school day are all options being looked at. We will be keeping you up to date with any changes being considered.

There are details in this newsletter about a student data sharing programme called "Assay". This allows you to look at your child's 'dashboard' and get a range of worthwhile information with a quick glance. I strongly recommend you take the time to have a look at this programme. It could serve as a good conversation starter at the next Whanau day on Thursday 28th June.

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Parent Information regarding Junior Reports

Taupo-nui-a-Tia College is now reporting on junior progression using National Curriculum Levels (NCL). The reporting system we have chosen aims to retain continuity between primary, intermediate and secondary education. This transition has become even more pertinent since the government's announcement to discontinue National Standards in primary schools. The points below will explain how to read and interpret the new report.

Subject Specific Skills

Curriculum Levels: When reporting on Curriculum Levels, the higher the number, the higher the curriculum level. Students are expected to move through these levels as their schooling progresses. We have provided a guide to illustrate standard progression against national expectation.

The descriptors, in order of achievement, are:

In addition, subjects will now report on levels of progress within Curriculum Levels:

- B = Basic: the student is working at the beginning of the curriculum level
- P = Proficient: the student consistently and confidently meets the curriculum level
- A = Advanced: the student has mastered the skill or understanding at that curriculum level, and is ready to move to the next curriculum level

While Level 4 is appropriate for most subjects at Year 9, and Level 5 for Year 10, there are some exceptions as follows:

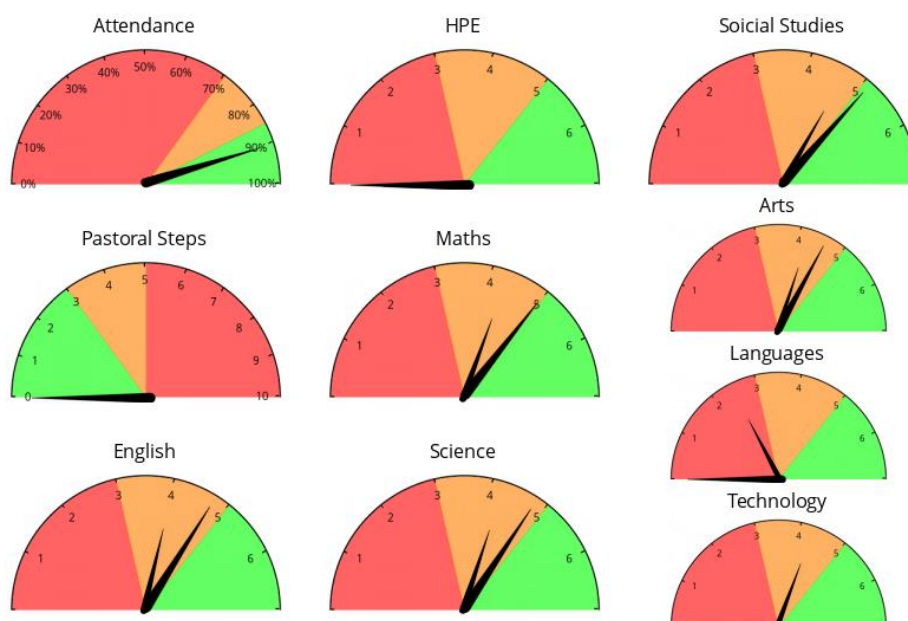
- Students with special learning needs
- Students who are learning a subject for the first time at college (for example, a second language) are unlikely to follow these trends

Two results will be completed for each assessment. Evidence is obtained through a range of informal and formal assessment approaches.

- 1) Prior understanding: Illustrates the students' NCL prior to any teaching or learning.
- 2) Progression in understanding: shows the development in understanding following subject specific teaching and learning.

Parent Portal

An additional page has been incorporated into the parent portal to show progression in subject areas. Whilst this is an average of all subject results the dashboard quickly shows prior understanding the (short arrow) and progression in understanding (long arrow). This can be accessed through the "Graphs" tab on the Parent Portal.



Parent Information regarding Junior Reports

Attendance

Reports show the number of periods students have been present in each subject.

Some of the absences will have been explained (for example illness, work experience, family matters) and others may not. However, the greater the number of periods missed in a subject, the less likely the student is to achieve their potential.

Key Competencies

The NZ Curriculum identifies five key competencies:

- thinking
- using language, symbols and texts
- managing self
- relating to others
- participating and contributing

These competencies expand on the essential academic skills, which teachers are required to report on. The key competencies are universal; they are intended to integrate skills, knowledge, attitudes, and values that all students require. Our scale ranges from *Consistently* to *Rarely* to help measure each student's competency in any given area in every subject.

NCEA – Achievement standards and unit standards

If a student is completing Achievement Standards or Unit Standards in a subject, they may receive the following grades:

- Achieved
- Achieved with Merit
- Achieved with Excellence
- Not Achieved

Other grades, which could be given for Achievement Standard or Unit Standard assessments, are:

- Absent: Absent when assessment was carried out.
- Not Submitted: Test/Assignment not done = Not Achieved.
- Not Attending: Not present at time of assessment.
- Not Applicable: The unit of work does not apply to the student current time.

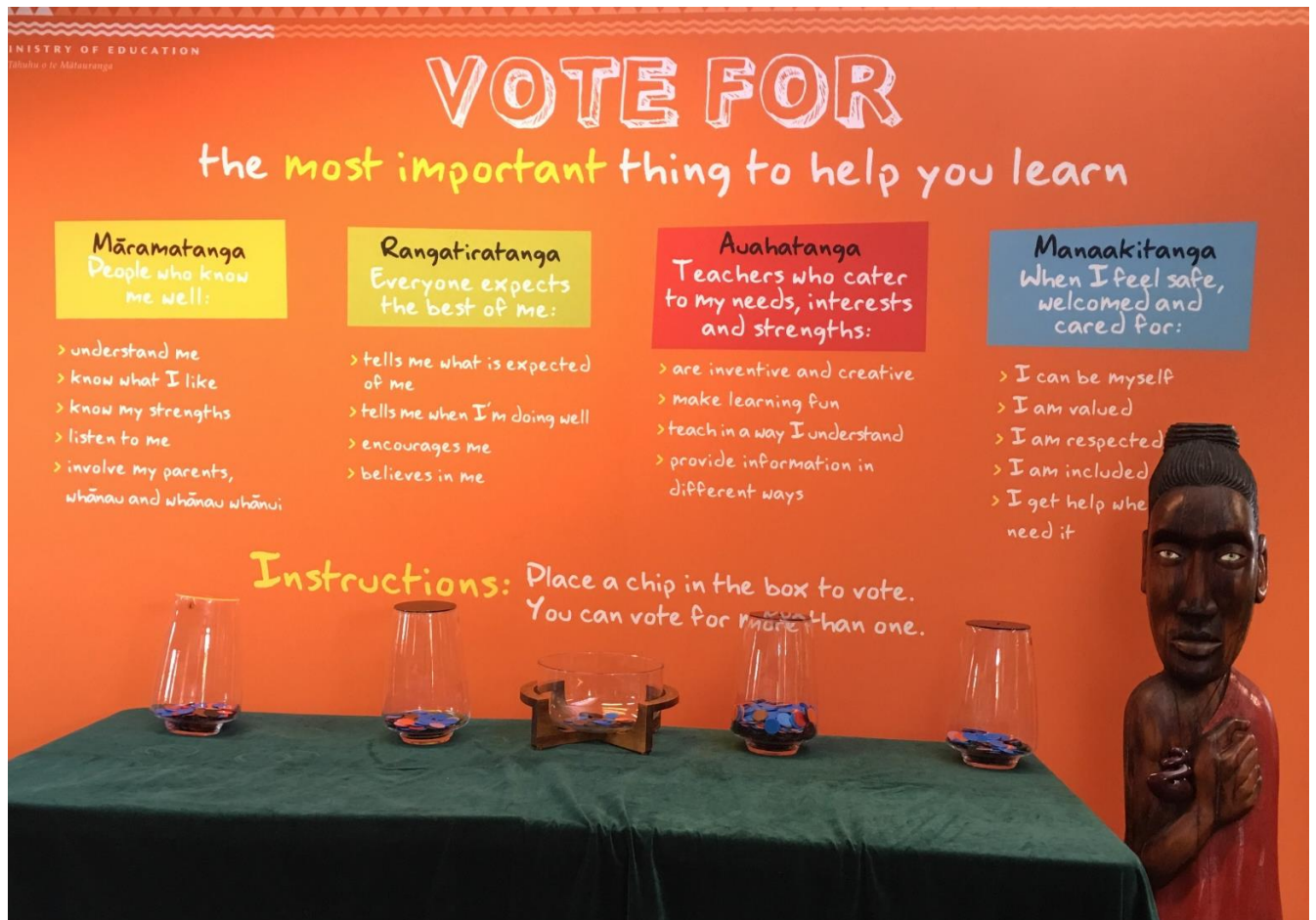
Taupo-nui-a-Tia College has spoken!

The “WALL” gives us more information about what our rangatahi want

The Ministry of Education have a resource called 'The Voting Wall' that is available to schools to gain information about how their students, staff and community feel about the important aspects that contribute to the welfare and learning of students.

Taupo-nui-a-Tia were fortunate enough to have the wall at our school in the last week of term one, to allow us to determine which of these aspects are the MOST important in the eyes of our students and staff. The four aspects are:

- **Māramatanga** – people who know me well
- **Rangatiratanga** – everyone expects the best of me
- **Auahatanga** – teachers who cater to my needs, interests and strengths
- **Manaakitanga** – when I feel safe, welcomed and cared for



The results indicated that our students and staff felt that **Auahatanga** was the most important thing that helped them learn. This reflects and echoes a nationwide educational shift in the way the education system is heading, towards more personalised and individualised learning.

This was a great activity that will give our school even more student voice to start those conversations around our future curriculum, as well as teaching and learning. Our evidence will also be sent to the Ministry for a nationwide tally as to what is the most important thing that helps students learn.

2018 BALL TICKETS

NZQA fees do not need to be paid until the end of August and sporting fees have to be paid on an individual basis, as per the signed permission slips. We are always grateful to receive the school donations, but this is a voluntary payment and not essential before buying a ball ticket.

STUDENTS FEELING UNWELL

SCHOOL SHOES


